The Wakefield Tsunami Swim Team is off to a great start. These swimmers were about to compete in the freestyle relay- the last event of the June 17 swim meet!

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



Community Landscaping

Due to the drought issues and high temperatures the Board is going to wait on plantings in the community until this fall to ensure that the plantings have a chance for survival. The goal is to keep our Wakefield community looking as nice as possible. Many people think that the drought is over, but remember that it was this time last year when the rains stopped. Let's wait until we have some comfort that our investments in plantings will not go to waste.

Raleigh Water Customers Irrigation Schedule

Raleigh water customers now may irrigate twice each week. The City Council recently approved the addition of weekend watering. Raleigh's Stage I water conservation measures provide for irrigation for odd property addresses on Tuesdays and Saturdays and even property addresses on Wednesdays and Sundays. Irrigation on these days by automatic irrigation systems is permitted only from midnight to 10 a.m. Those who use Raleigh-supplied water in garden-hose-attached lawn irrigation sprinklers may irrigate from 6 to 10am and between 6 and 10pm on assigned days. The council action also allows for hand-held watering at any time.

Speeding

We were asked to include something about speeding on Sycamore Grove inside of Berkshire. Unfortunately,

speeding is not limited to one street or section of Wakefield. The best way to address this issue is to complain to the City Police and request additional patrols in our area. Try to get the license plate of the vehicle(s) in question.

Garbage Cart and Recycling Bin Removal Guidelines

Proper preparation of the materials and placement of the containers is essential to efficient service and keeping neighborhoods attractive and litter free. Please observe the following:

- Containers must be placed at the curb, not in the street, no earlier than noon on the day before the designated collection day and must be removed from the curb and placed in an inconspicuous location, not easily seen as viewed from the street facing the front door of a house, no later than 7 p.m. on the day after the designated collection day.
- Containers must be placed at least five (5) feet away from any obstruction (including mailboxes, transformers, parked cars, and light poles) and must not be placed near low hanging branches or power lines.

As stated in the City code section 7-2005.d.3, "Any person who places refuse or refuse containers upon a public street or in the public right-of-way before the time designated in this Code or leaves refuse or refuse containers in a public street or in the public right-of-way beyond the time allowed in this Code shall be in violation of the provisions of this Code and shall be subject to a fifty dollar (\$50) civil penalty. "Pooper Scooper" Law - Do you drink what your dog poops? (From a City of Raleigh pamphlet)

The person responsible for any dog must remove feces deposited by the dog from any private property unless the owner of the property has given permission allowing such use of the property. Removal of animal feces is not just a courtesy, it is an environmental necessity.

When animal feces are not removed as required by law, rain water carries it into the storm drains. The City's stormwater system is separate and does not treat water. This gravity-directed system merely carries stormwater complete with litter, including animal feces, on its natural path to the creeks and streams that feed into the Neuse River -- a source of drinking water for millions of North Carolinians. The animal feces that you see going into that stormwater drain will wind up in our creeks, streams and the Neuse

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

River. This pollution leads to the development of oxygenrobbing algae and other problem organism, which can cause fish kills and human health threats. Pick up after your pet at all times.

The design consultant has prepared preliminary Design Development drawings for the Phase I improvements: Main Entry Drive and Parking, Welcome center to provide on site information and space to support on site adventure program staff, (in the future this facility will convert to the care taker facility), Ropes course, climbing wall, and the south multi purpose open space with picnic shelters and a playground. There will also be an entry drive and parking for the Forest Ridge South area.

Upon approval from the Corps and DENR the consultant will prepare final design development drawings to be presented to the Master Plan committee. The consultant will then continue to finalize construction documents with completion of the drawings anticipated in the fall, bidding late 2008, award of contract in early 2009 and completion of Phase I in early 2010. We are looking forward to a nice new amenity for our community.

Annual Wakefield Plantation Community Association Meeting

The annual association meeting was held April 9 at the Wakefield High School auditorium. We had THREE Council Members in attendance, which was very impressive. Councilman Rodger Koopman gave an update on watershed rezoning and and briefly touched on the Department of Transportation 98 Bypass project.

Mary Ann Baldwin gave an update on the Falls of Neuse Bridge project. The good news is that the new bridge will be built first so there will be no tremendous inconvenience to the residents of Wakefield and surrounding area. The project should begin in Spring 2009 and is anticipated to take two years with a projected completion date of 2011.

Councilman Stephenson announced that the City of Raleigh was going to begin lowering the restrictions due to the recent substantial rainfall that was able to assist in removing the city from its current drought conditions. Please note the current restrictions given in this Wakefield Whistle issue.

Elections were also held at the annula meeting for a few of the board positions. The outcome of the Board positions follows:

Middleton Street Parking issue

Many high school students have been parking on Middleton Streets especially along Schoolhouse Rd. creating a rather ugly parking lot situation for those neighbors.

The association has tried all angles on having the students park their vehicles elsewhere within the association's limits as the streets are public and the drivers are non-residents. We have had several discussions with the principal and are now working with Counselor Koopman on trying to find a more permanent fix to the problem. The Board is scheduling a meeting with the residents of Middleton in the near future to discuss different scenarios of resolution. The residents have completed a petition to city council, and it has been determined that "No Parking" signs will be put onto Schoolhouse to prohibit the parking of the high school students. With the surge in enrollment of students, there is still a concern that the high school students will take over other streets in Middleton if Schoolhouse is no longer an option and the actual school parking lot is full. We will keep residents of this area updated in this important matter.

98 By-pass Connection

The Wakefield Community Association Board is helping to bring the parties, DOT, the builder, Cedar Grove residents, state legislator, etc., together to try and work out some things regarding the 98 By-Pass connecting up to Wakefield Plantation Drive. The HOA is very limited in what we can do but all efforts are being made to make this upcoming project manageable for our community.

Summer Pet Safety

Meet Greg Barley



Meet our new Wakefield HOA president Greg Barley. Greg has served on the HOA board as a director for the past two years and was re-elected to the board for another term at our annual meeting this past April. Greg has been involved in our community since moving to Wakefield seven years ago.

"I was a part of the neighborhood group Concerned Citizens of Wakefield even before we had a board," said Barley. "We looked at issues from the park to the Falls of Neuse bridge."

The Barley family chose to live in Wakefield because the builder in St. James had a floor plan that suited the needs of a family with four children. "And the fact that Wakefield was a premier community where there would be good property appreciation," he added.

He decided to join the Wakefield HOA board since he has had experience in serving on a homeowners board. "In Fredericksburg, I served on the HOA Board for a development that included about 2,000 homes," said Barley. "I served in various capacities, including President. I wanted to share my knowledge and experience with Wakefield."

His goals on the board include seeing Wakefield property values be maintained while keeping homeowner dues in check.

As our Community Association President, Greg sees a few bigger issues facing the neighborhood in the near future. "The watershed issue is coming back but it will not be as restrictive as before," he said. "The original proposed restrictions were beyond what the state requires."

Another upcoming issue is the 98 bypass project. "The major elements of this project design are in place and unfortunately, Wakefield Plantation Drive will eventually connect to 98 bypass," he said. "But as soon as it opens, we will get a traffic study to assess the need for traffic calming measures."

From Wakefield Plantation, a driver will be able to turn

right onto the bypass but no left turn allowed. Coming off the bypass, a driver will be able to enter onto Wakefield Plantation Drive from either direction.

By day, Greg Barley is a nuclear chemist and works as a supervisor for the corporate laboratory at Progress Energy. Prior to moving to Raleigh, the Barley family lived in Fredericksburg, Virginia, for three years. "I was born in York, Pennsylvania, and my wife was from Lancaster, Pennsylvania," he said. "We lived in Pennsylvania for about seven years before moving to Maryland, where we lived for seven years when we moved to Fredericksburg, Virginia."

The entire family likes many things about the Raleigh area. "We like the variety of available activities in the area, from hockey to basketball to baseball," he said.

His wife, Burneta, is a registered nurse. "We like the large medical facilities in the area since my wife is a nurse." He said. "Our oldest daughter, Jessica, is married and lives with her husband and our two grandchildren (one boy, one girl) in Knightdale. Our oldest son, Matthew, bought a townhome in Kingston last fall." Their youngest daughter, Laura, and their youngest son, Jonathan, attend college and live at home.

Greg Barley is also very involved with the new Forest Ridge park project. He was appointed to the Raleigh Parks, Recreation, and Greenway Advisory Board four years ago and is now on his third 2-year term. "My passion was to see Forest Ridge Park become a reality. This park will bring recreation facilities within a short distance of the community," he said. "I was co-chairperson on the Master Plan Committee for Forest Ridge Park. This committee developed the master plan that was submitted to the Raleigh City Council for approval."

If the park plan goes according to schedule, they will start turning dirt in the next year.

If he could change something about the community, Greg would like more residents to understand how the HOA operates, what the dues support and why obtaining approval for outdoor improvements is necessary. "If you are making changes to your home, contact the community manager at PPM to see if you need approval many things need approval like building a fence, adding a pool or cutting trees down," he said. "You are not allowed to cut a tree of a certain size without approval." These rules are in place mainly to protect the value of all our homes in Wakefield.

We thank Greg Barley for his dedication to our neighborhood and for his continued community service.
