New Falls of Neuse Bridge and widening projects

On March 10, three representatives from the City of Raleigh staff met with the Wakefield Board of Directors at the beginning of the regularly scheduled Board meeting. They discussed the status of the New Falls of Neuse Bridge and the widening of Falls of Neuse Road.

As we know, the first part of the project to be completed will be the construction of the new bridge across the Neuse River. Engineering work for this extension of New Falls of Neuse Road is expected to be completed by summer with construction expected to begin by November of this year. Construction of this section is expected to take approximately 18 months.

The design of the second part of this project, the widening of Falls of Neuse Road from New Falls of Neuse to Raven Ridge Road, is still being reviewed. Representatives from NORCHOA (the coalition of HOAs along Falls of Neuse Road south of the river) have lobbied the state DOT to make this section of road a non-median, 4 lane highway with middle turn lane. According to the city representatives, the state DOT is continuing to support construction of a road with a median, which is the position that we in Wakefield support. While final decisions have not been made, the current plans are for a four lane highway divided by a median. It is hoped that decisions can be reached and designs completed so that construction of this part of the project can begin at the completion of, or prior to, the completion of the construction of the new bridge and connection to Falls of Neuse Road.

The Board will continue to monitor this important project and provide updates as additional information becomes available.

Community News

Neighborhood Resident Alert:

We have received a few emails concerning break-ins in our community and wanted everyone to be aware. Please remember to lock your cars and houses and be on the look-out for this type of small crime as it may increase due to the bad economy. In mid-March on Sargas (Prescott neighborhood), a car was broken into late at night/very early morning. They stole a GPS system and an iphone, plus about 30.00 dollars in cash.

There was a Lexus stolen in Middleton on Mabry Mill last month, but they found it abandoned and damaged later in the week. On Kaysmount (also in Prescott) a resident had their briefcase in the car with their lap top computer in it. Thieves took the computer and left the briefcase.

Also a basement alarm was set off on a Monday morning at 9:43 am. There were no signs of forced entry but the resident's deadbolt was not locked but the regular handle lock was. Someone may have tried to tamper with the door and the alarm scared them away.

IN ADDITION TO CALLING POLICE, please make sure to report these types of incidents to York Security — our Wakefield Patrol. The number is 863-8090. But if someone is breaking into your house, dial 9-1-1 first!

Here is a good safety tip from a resident in Weatherby Villas:

PUT YOUR CAR KEYS BESIDE YOUR BED AT

NIGHT. If you hear a noise outside your home or someone trying to get in your house, just press the panic button for your car. The alarm will be set off, and the horn will continue to sound until either you turn it off or the car's battery dies. Next time you come home for the night and you start to put your keys away, think of this: It's a security alarm system that you probably already have and requires no installation. Test it. It will go off from most everywhere inside your house and will keep honking until you reset it with the button on the key chain.

Concern over Empty Homes: More than a month ago, a fore-closed vacant house in the Greystone subdivision apparently had a pipe burst on the top floor and water began flowing out of the siding and the garage and basement. Neighbors attempted to contact the (former) homeowner and had no response so they asked the Raleigh Fire Department to come out and shut off the water from the street. First, we should maintain a watchful eye over the growing number of empty homes in our neighborhood and; second, ensure that we do not try to take matters into our own hands and make things worse or incur liability for something going wrong. Drive Safely and Remind Kids about Street Safety!

Here is a reminder for young children, their parents and all drivers. There was a near tragedy in Carrington last month on a Thursday at 5:00pm. A driver was proceeding down Queensland Rd., fortunately going about 10 miles UNDER the speed limit, as he was watching for the numerous children that always play in the street there. There were many cars parked in the driveway of this residence, and also in the street in front. A young boy jumped on his bike, not wearing a helmet, and came down the driveway. He could not see the car coming because his view was obstructed by the cars, and the driver could not see the child for the same reason. The car struck the child, he fell off his bike, but thankfully he was not injured because the driver was going slowly and had a split second to react and hit the brakes. The police were called and he determined the driver was not at fault, there was nothing he could have done.

Residents should be reminded of several things. When you park cars in the street, it obstructs everyone's views of the road. Secondly, streets are built for motorized vehicles and especially at high traffic times, such as 5:00 pm when people are returning home from work, parents and children should be especially vigilant about not playing in the street. Everyone needs to slow down, as this driver did.

Deer-Resistant Plants

No plants are totally deer-proof. Damage from deer browsing is most severe when snow cover or extreme cold has reduced food availability. Another problem time is early spring when young succulent growth provides attractive browsing. When food is in short supply, deer will browse even the most undesirable plants. Deer have been known to eat new tender growth whenever it appears regardless of the time of year. Additionally, to further protect plants homeowners may use repellents and fencing. But please remember, the deer were here first! Annuals, perennials and bulbs rarely damaged by deer include varieties such as Yarrow, Monkshood, Daffodil Garlic, Star of Persia, Lily Leek, Japanese Anemone, Common Dill, Snapdragon, Larkspur, Lily-of-the-Valley, Neopolitan Cyclamen, Foxglove, Wood Fern, purple Coneflower, Marigold, Yucca, Thyme, Buttercup, Lavender, Daffodil, and Hyacinth.

Shrubs rarely damaged by deer include varieties such as Bearberry, Boxwood, Barberry, American Bittersweet, Creeping Wintergreen, Red Osier Dogwood, Russian Olive, Rose of Sharon, European Privet, Blueberry Elder and Lydia Morris Hollies. Trees rarely damaged by deer include varieties such as Heritage Birch, Paper Birch, Bottlebrush Buckeye, Douglas fir, Scotch Pine, Colorado Blue Spruce, Japanese Cedar and Japanese Falsecypress. (If you want to attract hummingbirds, plant: Bee Balm, Butterfly Bush, Delphinium, Rose of Sharon, Trumpet Vine, Trumpet Honeysuckle, Lantana, Fuschia, Silk Tree, Hollyhock, Indian Pink, and Red Buckeye.)

Before all her many volunteer positions, Margaret worked for a number of years at the Associated General Contractors of America, a trade association, prior to working for the General Assembly. "I earned early retirement from AGC and after a few months became bored with inactivity so then I applied and was hired at the General Assembly," she said. "I really liked it, it was interesting work and you learned a lot about how things are done and what laws are pending."

Her job at the N. C. General Assembly was as a Senate Clerk for about 10 years ending in 2001. "This was a part-time job and we worked when the Legislature was in session," she added. "This was clerical and public relations work dealing with constituents and assisting the Senator for whom I worked."

Now Margaret is serving as president of her community's board of directors. "It takes time and dedication but someone has to do it," she said. "It is such a great board of directors that it has been easy to be the president."
